




## INDIANS, CITY REACH AGREEMENT






THE FIRST OF THE "PUSHBUTTON" TANKS, the Centurion, Mark III, is shown above as two of the models now an issue to Lord Strathcono's Horse (R.C.), traveled through some rough terrain at Sarcee military camp Tuesday afternoon. The Strathcona's are now in the process of converting from the use of the obsolescent U.S. Sherman to the new Centurion. A gunnery school in the use of the new 20-pounder gun, which will fire while the tank is on the move, is being conducted at Currie Barracks while a driving and maintenance course operates at Sarcee.



FIVE OF 10 BAZOOKA TEAMS engaged in firing practice at Sarcee military camp are shown above as they crouched in their weapon pits waiting the order to fire. The 2,36-inch rocket launcher shown here was used with great effect during the Second Great War. Although considerably smaller than the 3.5-incher to be used by the special force troops later, the principle for training purposes is the same. Gas masks are worn by the troops during practice purely as a precautionary measure.

### NUCLEAR EXPLOSION.

This picture shows a simulated atomic bomb seconds after it was exploded dur-Ing an army exercise Sunday at Sarcee reserve. Although the bomb dispersed more rapidly than an actual atom weapon would have, it still looked authentic in its early stages. Forces defending Calgary during the exercise found it necessary to explode a nuclear bomb in order to keep the "enemy" from capturing Calgary.
